Reports

AGM

The AGM was held at St. John's, Cullingworth on 15th April. Fourteen members attended the meeting. Thank you to Robert for hosting the meeting and arranging for members to play the organ afterwards.

Hauptwerk by Graham Gribbin

It was good to see fourteen of our members at the meeting at GSG Pianos in Halifax on 20th May where we were joined by some members from the Halifax Association.

HAUPTWERK

On the 20th May I travelled over to Halifax from York to visit Graham Gribbin's piano showroom which he has created in the redundant church of St Andrew's, Holmfield – an impressive set- up. Unfortunately, Graham's new four manual Hauptwerk organ delivery had been delayed. He had intended to demonstrate it to the organist's association meeting that day but, in its absence, asked me if I could give a short overview on the Hauptwerk "system". Sheila has asked me to do a similar thing here.

To begin with, I must say that I am not an expert on the subject nor an electronic engineer or computer technician but neither I nor you need to be.

I was introduced to the HW system just over ten years ago and have the fine Hereford Cathedral Willis in my dining room(!) and a simple portable version for use in some of the small rural churches in which I play and accompany our SATB choir. HW is not a digital organ in the sense most organists would understand as this system uses full note by note, stop by stop recordings of the organ that you hear when you press a key. Therefore, the sound you hear is from a recording (of each pipe) taken near to the pipes themselves and *usually*, with the natural reverberation of the building (known as a "wet" recording).

I will not go into more detail here as there are lots of very good introductions to HW on "YouTube" such as "Beauty In Sound" (with Richard McVeigh) or the HW site itself.

To get started all you need is a minimum of one midi keyboard, a laptop or computer with enough memory (preferably 64-bit and 8 gigabytes of RAM) and a pair of headphones.

My home set- up, with Hereford installed, runs on a dedicated 16 GB computer, and plays through studio monitor speakers (or headphones) and is an old Norwich draw stop console.

My portable set- up uses two (cheap) midi keyboards (M-Audio), a second-hand HP EliteBook laptop and a pair of Samson powered PA speakers and runs the *free* HW download of St Anne's Church, Moseley (near Birmingham). I do not have a pedal board (as this would be too bulky) and this St Anne's download has an autobass facility. In summary, it is fantastic to have a home-practise organ with such realism and after starting with a basic set- up you can download (usually at a cost!) a German organ to play Bach or a French organ etc, etc. There are also many used electronic organ consoles available which will convert to HW.
